Why Do I Need to Worship on Sunday Night?

"Why do I need to worship on Sunday night if I fulfilled my obligation on Sunday morning?" To ask the question in this way indicates that one may fail to understand the heart of Christianity.

Christianity is the religion of "the second mile" not the religion of doing just barely enough to "get by." It is the religion of daily self-sacrifice (Luke 9:23). It is the religion of putting the Lord and his kingdom (church) first at all times, not just when the mood strikes us (Mat. 6:33). Worshipping God involves more than mere obligations. It involves our relationship with God and our brethren.

It reaches upward, outward, and inward. So, why...? Among other reasons...

- I need the spiritual strength, Bible knowledge, and edification that results from additional worship and Bible study to help me personally become more spiritually minded and grow closer to God (James 4:8).
- I need the spiritual food (nourishment) that comes only from partaking of the milk and meat of God's word (1 Pet. 2:1-2).
- I need the Christian fellowship that comes by being with my church family (1 John 1:3).
- I need to let my Christian light shine and glorify God more often (Mat. 5:16).
- My brethren need my influence and encouragement just as I need theirs (1 Thes. 5:11, 14; Rom. 14:19; Heb. 3:13).
- My family needs to see where my spiritual priorities are so that I may properly influence my loved ones for Jesus (1 Pet. 3:1-7).
- My respect for the authority of our eldership demands it (Heb. 13:7,17).
- I need to demonstrate just whose side I am on (the Lord's or Satan's) (Mat. 6:24).

At the first return from exile, the Jews had laid the foundation of the temple but slacked off. The Lord sent his prophet Haggai to the Jews to encourage them to get back to work on the temple. The Lord reminded them, "I am with you" (1:13); "Be strong and work, for I am with you;" "Do not fear;" From this day on I will bless you" (2:4-5) and "I have chosen you" (2:19). In response, the people obeyed God's voice and feared the Lord (2:12). They went right to work on the temple

Sometime even the people of the greater covenant can become discouraged and focused on other things besides the mission of the church to preach the gospel. A gospel meeting is an opportunity to encourage all of us to stay strong, to work hard and to remember that we belong to God as His treasured possession. This Friday, Justin Rogers of Henderson, TN, will do just that with "Lessons from the Psalm."

In what ways can we work for the success of our meeting? We can be strong in our enthusiasm for the meeting. We can show enthusiasm as we invite our friends, family, coworkers and neighbors to come. You could be the only one in their lives who care enough for their soul to say anything. Nothing will top a personal invitation.

We can also be strong in our attendance. Some of us may have no choice and cannot attend due to work or illness. Let us make it a goal that we will do all that we can to be here. Throw in your support for the speaker and for the gospel by attending each service of the meeting. Our enthusiasm for the meeting will be so encouraging to our speaker.

An enthusiastic welcome before and after the services to all our visitors will contribute greatly to the success of the meeting. A first-time visitor's first impression of the church will not be the size of the building nor the worship services. That first impression will be made by how the person was greeted at the door. Greeting someone with a genuine smile and a firm handshake will go a long way. Therefore, arrive early and stay later to and let them know how glad you are that they came. That enthusiasm might just get them to return.

Another way to welcome others is to leave the best parking spaces and seating to our visitors. If you can, park farther away from the doors so that our visitors will not have far too walk. Also, sitting closer to the front will show consideration to those who might arrive late. We can show our hospitality by inviting them to eat with us after the morning worship. Maybe such spontaneous courtesy will encourage visitors to inquire more about what they will have seen and heard. What a wonderful and open opportunity to share our love for others with the gospel.

If we have shown enthusiasm in sowing the seed and watering it, God will provide the harvest (1 Corinthians 3:6). Even if not a single person answers the Lord's call, each will know that the Lord is the center of our worship and our lives and that the Bible is the center of our preaching and people are the center of our mission.
