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Baptism: Death, Burial, and Resurrection

For whatever reasons, religious people disagree on just about everything having to do with baptism. Confusion reigns, indicating that Satan has done his homework well (while we, perhaps, have been preoccupied with more "sophisticated" matters). Just what does the Bible say on the subject? In his letters to Rome and Colosse, Paul taught that in baptism, we identify with, and receive the benefits of, the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus.

Sin makes us spiritually dead. "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). Before becoming Christians, the Colossians had been "dead in (their) trespasses" (Colossians 2:13). Though alive physically, they were separated from God by their sins.

As they obeyed the gospel of Jesus, however, they were "buried with Him in baptism" (2:12). Just as Jesus, having died, was buried in Joseph of Arimithea's tomb, so these who were dead in sin were buried as they were plunged under the water.

Romans 6:4 gives an additional detail – they were "buried with Him through baptism into death." Yes, they were baptized into death. But wait! Didn't we just read that they were already dead in sin before baptism? Why, then, were they baptized into death? Because the death into which they were baptized was a death to sin (see Romans 6:2). That is, in baptism they terminated their relationship with sin. So remember: before baptism, they were dead in sin; while buried in baptism they died to sin.

Thus far we have seen baptism's identity with Jesus' death and burial. What about the resurrection? Romans 6:4 says "that just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." Likewise, Colossians 2:12, after speaking of baptism as a burial, says that "you also were raised with Him through faith in the working of God who raised Him from the dead." Just as Jesus came forth from the tomb, triumphant over sin and death, so we come forth from baptism cleansed from sin by His blood, alive from the dead (spiritually), not by our own merit, but by faith in the working of God.

Is baptism essential? It is only as essential as dying to sin; only as necessary as being raised with Jesus to live a new life; only as indispensable as identifying with the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ.

Maybe I'm naive, but I really don't understand what all the controversy is about.

Haters of Mankind?

One of the many accusations often cast upon Christians of the first and second centuries is that they were "haters of mankind." Even back then, people resorted to name calling when they could not argue against the truths of Christ. Why were they called "haters of mankind?" Early disciples of Jesus refused to take part in the social and religious life of the people around them.

Let's suppose that you are a Christian in the first century. Your neighbor has just invited you to celebrate his daughter's birthday at the local temple. A sacrifice will be offered in the name of the god to thank the god for the child. You turn down the invitation. Another neighbor has invited you to the wedding of his son at the local community center (aka the temple), but you refuse to come because of the sacrifice that will be offered. Before long your neighbors come to think that you hate them and everyone else. They call you names like "holier-than-thou" and "hater." Multiply that scenario many times over and the population believe that Christians are a nuisance.

Fast forward 2000 years. Because Christians refuse to worship at the altar of the Supreme Court, which recently redefined marriage, they too are called "haters," "bigots" and "homophobes." It is a way of shaming us. However, saving marriage, the family and our nation is something worth suffering for (1 Peter 3:13-17). Let the names come; it is a sign that we are doing something right and a sign of their destructive ways (Philippians 1:27-28). Besides, these enemies of the cross are the ones who act shamefully—and glory in it (Philippians 3:18-19). Someday, they must answer for it.

Christianiphobes and Bibliaphobes think they have a corner on the Biblical definitions of sin, love and tolerance. They behave like love never existed until they came along. They think love never judges and is never intolerant of another's sin. However, what they call love, the Scriptures call lust and perversion (Matthew 5:28-29; Romans 1:24-32). True love "does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth" (1 Corinthians 13:6). True love desires to rescue people from the destruction (physical, emotional and spiritual) that lust and perversion bring (Jude 23). True love does not want nor cause another to sin against God. God has already made judgment on these behaviors. It is up to mankind to adhere to them and decide who is or is not living by them.
