Since we have become a part of Christ, we partake of His nature. He very clearly said, "I and the Father are one." The Father, Son and Holy Spirit have no selfish agendas. They are truly one in purpose, care, joy and sorrow.

The Church's Responsibility to the Elders (part I)

In the final lesson in the eldership, we looked into the church's responsibility toward the elders. The Holy Spirit makes overseers of the church (Acts 20:28). He transforms certain men into the image of Christ. The church sees the fruit of this transformation standing out in traits outlined by Paul in 1 Timothy 3:1-7 (cf. Galatians 5:22-23). The church selects these men to lead them. Therefore, the first responsibility of the church is to select its own leaders.

We have seen this pattern before. When Moses was burdened with the civil cases of the Israelites, Jethro advised him to "look for able men from all the people, men who fear God, who are trustworthy and hate a bribe, and place such men over the people...So Moses listened to the voice of his father-in-law and did all that he had said" (Exodus 18:21, 24).

When Moses addressed the next generation of Israelites in Deuteronomy, he revealed more about that selection process: "Choose for your tribes wise, understanding, and experienced men, and I will appoint them as your heads' (1:13). This method pleased Israel (v. 14). The Israelites selected these men based on Moses' instructions.

When we come to the New Testament, the early church in Acts 6 followed the same pattern. When the Greek-speaking Jewish widows were not receiving food, the apostles could not be burdened with this work (vv. 1-2, 4). They presented to the church a solution to the problem. The church would take care of it. How? "Brothers, pick out from among you seven men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we will appoint to this duty" (v. 3). Like Israel, this instruction "pleased the whole gathering." They set seven men "before the apostles, and they prayed and laid their hands on them" (v. 5).

The New Testament church today can follow that pattern as the early church followed Moses' pattern. The elders at Hamburg Pike have made recommendation for an additional elder, but it is the church that decides whether the appointment should go through.

We as Americans can understand this process because of our representative form of government. We select representatives from among our own people who understand us. The Greek names of the seven men suggest that the men were of the same background as the Hellenist widows they would serve. They could communicate and understand their needs.

We can see God's wisdom in this kind of leadership: a plurality of men (cf. Acts 14:23) from among people that we know well. A stranger sent from a remote denominational hierarchy to "pastor" the church cannot fulfill God's desire and pattern for church leadership. It is much easier to submit to a group of men that the church itself has chosen. Then, once the selection is made, the church has a responsibility to submit to their leadership. We will see what this submission entails next week.
