He is a kind, elderly soul that enjoys doing yard work alongside his wife. Nothing, however, could have prepared me for his closing statement before we returned to work in our yards. After finding out that I am a minister, he said, "Keep up the good work. We need more people like you to remind us about religion and what we should be doing."

My first thoughts were; what makes me so special? It was not me personally, but what I represented to this elderly gentleman. Then it dawned on me, He is right. We need more people in this world that properly represent Christ.

We need more Christians! We need more Christians, because Jesus told us to grow our numbers. "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you," (Matthew 28:18-20). Is it from Heaven or from Men?

In my sermon drawn from Matthew 21:24-27, we set out to establish the authority for religious belief. If Jesus taught something, if His apostles, who were guided by the Spirit (John 14:26) taught it and if the early church believed and practiced it (precedent), then it is from heaven. We raised several scenarios to test whether the source of a belief could be man-made. Neither the majority nor our parents, preacher, the creeds and traditions of men or feelings can be our standard of belief or practice.

In addition to these five things, neither is the Old Testament. Certain Christians within the early church taught that Gentiles had to be circumcised to be saved (Act 15:1). Having Gentiles as fellow heirs of the promise was unprecedented and some of the early Christians did not know how to handle the matter, so they began making human laws and placing them on the Gentiles. However, the apostles stood in opposition to this. Peter said that even the Jews could not bear the burden, why pile it on the Gentiles? The entire book of Galatians was written about this issue. The new covenant made the old covenant practice of circumcision obsolete. What has always mattered was circumcision of the heart.

Some people today want to do the same as those few in the early church. If they cannot find something in the New Testament to fulfill their desires, they appeal to the Old Testament for it. The use of instruments in worship is one such matter. However, the Old Testament is no longer our authority. When, on the mountain, the Father spoke to Peter, James, and John, who wanted to honor the two pillars of the Old Testament, namely, Moses and Elijah, He said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5, emphasis mine--EW). Just in one story, we see the "chain" of authority: the Father, the Son, and the apostles. If Jesus nor his apostles did not teach it and the early church did not practice it, thus setting a precedent, neither should we. If we still insist on using the Old Testament in this way, will we be consistent and bring in candles, incense, bells, ephods, the ark and animal sacrifice?

Free For What?

"You, my brothers, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the sinful nature; rather serve one another in love." Galatians 5:13.

There are three things that jump out at me in this passage. First, Christians are called for freedom, not bondage. Second, grace is not a license to sin. Finally, idle hands are the devil's workshop.

Many of the brethren do not understand that Christ has called us out of the penalties of sin and into a state of grace that exists, not because of our performance, but his. In other words, to doubt one's salvation is to doubt one's Savior. Man's performance has nothing to do with salvation; the salvation was brought by God. I know; faith without works is dead, but it still isn't the works God is looking at, it's the faith that produces the works.

Some argue both for and against the former proposition based on the idea that we would therefore be free to sin. That is precisely the argument that Paul addresses in both Galatians and Romans. Freedom from sin's penalty is not a get-out-of-jail-free card; however, it is far from it. The grace of God makes man responsible for his own destiny. No, I don't mean we can earn salvation, but it is certainly our choice whether we want God's grace or not! God's grace will not cover the presumption that we are free to do as we please because we are saved.

Some are probably wondering where that third point came from. Paul places a live of service in direct opposition to carnality. He does so in other letters when he encourages industry as a prevention for gossip. If we want to avoid all sorts of sin, we need to be busy doing what is right. But it's more than just being busy. We need to be busy about the Lord's work. Any work can help avoid boredom, but only God's work can help avoid sin.
