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The Formula For Success

A popular motivational speaker lists three keys to success:

Purpose - One has to have a goal in mind and a way to reach that goal to truly achieve. Too many people wonder around aimlessly and then wonder why they never succeed. A purpose gives us something to strive for - something to achieve.

Passion - One must greatly desire the purpose to be attained - so much so that it drives him to do whatever is necessary to reach it. A purpose will rarely be realized unless one is truly passionate about it.

Performance - Purpose and passion are worthless without good, old-fashioned hard work. That's what it takes to get from point A to point B - success doesn't come to you, you must go to it.

These can be applied in Christianity, as well. Please consider the following:

Do you have a purpose to your Christianity? Do you set Christian goals to grow in the grace and knowledge of the Lord (2 Pet. 3:18)? Is every decision on earth made with the ultimate goal of attaining heaven in mind (Col. 3:1-2)?

Do you have passion for your Christianity? Do you have a zeal and fervor for serving the Lord (Titus 2:4)? Do you have a driving love for the Lord, and are you always joyful and excited to be a Christian (1 Pet. 1:8)?

Do you have performance in your Christianity? Do you labor daily for the Lord (Heb. 6:10)? Do you harmoniously involve yourself with the church in every way possible (Eph. 4:11-16)?

Let Paul's words in Phil. 3:12-14 inspire us to improve these in our Christian lives:

"Not that I have already attained, or am already perfected; but I press on, that I may lay hold of that for which Christ Jesus has also laid hold of me. Brethren, I do not count myself to have apprehended; but one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

Whose Imagination Is Wild?

Some skeptics suggest that the resurrection of Jesus took place in the disciples' heads. Hypnosis, for instance, may explain their faith. Perhaps Jesus was a master hypnotist. Before his death he trained his followers to have hypnotic experiences triggered by certain environmental cues. In these trances they would see Jesus alive.

This theory puts too much stock in the power of hypnosis. For one thing, not everyone is susceptible to it. Hypnosis certainly had no effect on Thomas. After the resurrection all the apostles were telling him what they had seen, but Thomas stubbornly refused to believe unless he could put his finger "in the mark of the nails" (John 20:25).

Furthermore, Jesus had no opportunity to play mental games with Saul of Tarsus. The staunchest witness of the resurrection became a disciple two or three years after the cross.

The hypothesis that the resurrection witnesses were hallucinating is equally untenable. Hallucinations result from drug use or serious illness. Neither of these factors was in play. Besides, a hallucination is an individual experience. But Paul mentions an occasion when Jesus "appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time" (1 Cor. 15:6).

The resurrection of Jesus was neither hallucination nor hypnotic suggestion. Luke, the author who penned more of the NT than anyone else, explained that his work was the product of thorough investigation: "Inasmuch as many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the things which have been accomplished among us, just as they were delivered to us by those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word, it seemed good to me also, having followed all things closely for some time past, to write an orderly account" (Luke 1:1-3). This "orderly account" (which includes both Luke and Acts) affirms that Jesus "presented Himself alive, after His suffering, by many convincing proofs" (Acts 1:3, NASB). The Christian believer has "convincing proofs." It is the skeptic who has the wild imagination!
