

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## Hard to Forget

The sun had just risen on a hot August day in 1944 in the small village of Plelo, in German-occupied France. The 15-year-old boy did not know why he and the other citizens of Plelo had been lined up before a firing squad in the middle of the town square. Perhaps they were being punished for harboring a unit of Marquisards, the French underground freedom fighters. Perhaps they were merely to satisfy the blood lust of the German commanding officer who, the evening before, had routed the small group of Marquisard scouts. All the boy knew was that he was about to die.

As he stood before the firing squad, he remembered the carefree days of his early childhood, before the war, spent roaming the green of the French countryside. He thought about all he would miss by never growing up. Most of all he was terrified of dying. "How will the bullets feel ripping through my body?" he wondered. He hoped no one could hear the whimperings coming from deep in his throat every time he exhaled.

Suddenly, the boy heard the sound of exploding mortar shells beyond the limits of his little village. Quickly rolling tanks could also be heard. The Germans were forced to abandon the firing squad and face a small unit of U.S. tanks with twenty GIs led by Bob Hamsley, a corporal in Patton's Third Army. A Marquisard captain had asked Hamsley for help. [Hamsley and his unit overtook the Germans.]

In 1990 the town of Plelo honored Bob Hamsley on the very spot where dozens of the town's citizens would have died if not for him. The man who initiated the search for Hamsley and the ceremony honoring him was the former mayor of Plelo, that same 15-year-old boy. He found the man who saved his life and honored him. \*

It's hard to forget your savior!

Consider the fact that because of our sins, you and I deserve to face the "firing squad" and suffer the penalty for our sins. "For the wages of sin is death..." (Romans 6:23).

But God sent Jesus to rescue us! In order to rescue us from sin, however, Jesus had to give His life for us and die on the cross to redeem us from sin. "He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, so that we might die to sins and live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed." – 1 Peter 2:24

Jesus will save those who accept His offer of salvation and life by placing their faith and trust in Him (Acts 16:30-31), turning from sin in repentance (Acts 17:30-31), confessing Jesus before men (Romans 10:9-10), and being baptized (immersed) into Christ for the forgiveness of sins (Acts 2:38). He will continue to cleanse from sin those who continue to demonstrate gratitude for their Savior by walking in the light of His Word (1 John 1:7).

When we were facing the "firing squad" for harboring sin in our lives, Jesus came to our rescue. He took our place and suffered the punishment for our sins for us.

It's hard to forget your Savior!

## Building up marriage

Have you ever wondered why you married your spouse? Have you ever felt that he or she no longer loves you or that you no longer love him or her? If you followed up with these questions with the question, "what do I do?" that means that you are ready to fight for your marriage. If you are having serious problems, I recommend a licensed counselor who respects and uses the authority of the Bible to help you. For those not at that point, let me suggest two things.

Remember your vows. The relationship between Jesus and the church is like the relationship between husband and wife. That's why Paul used it in Ephesians 5:22-33. "Husbands," Paul says, "love your wives." "Wives, respect your husbands."

How are husbands they to love their wives? Just as Jesus loved the church, His bride. How did Jesus love the church? He sacrificed himself for her. Husbands might be willing to sacrifice give their physical lives for her, but it means more than that. He must give up all other relationships before her. He must sacrifice anything that stands between him and her, a bad habit, a hobby or work.

How are wives to respect to their husbands? They must submit to their spiritual leadership. Upon learning of Christ's great sacrifice, one of the things that the first generation of Ephesian Christians did when they accepted Christ was to sacrifice expensive sorcery books by burning them. Their first and focused allegiance was now to Jesus and only to Jesus. They had forsaken all other gods for Him. Both Husbands and wives need to remember that part of their vow that says, "forsaking all others?" That's respect and submission to Christ who loved sacrificially. That means all allegiance and affection are to each other. A boundary has been set around you both and, no one, not even your children must be allowed inside that circle. It belongs to you both alone.

Second, Remember the works. In Revelation 2, what did Jesus tell the Ephesian church to do when he said: "you have abandoned the love you had at first?" He said, "Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first." To rekindle their love for Christ, they must see how far they had fallen. If you ever feel your love for Jesus grow cold, think about what you did when you first became a Christian. You were getting to know Him through the Scriptures. You spent time with him in daily prayer and weekly worship. Remember all the things Jesus did for you. This principle works in a stale marriage too. Rekindle your love for each other by doing the things you used to do at the beginning when you began dating. Spend time together. Make EVERY anniversary a big deal and those in the years that are a multiple of 5 even bigger. Remember all the things you said to each other and the notes you sent each other. Remember the places you went and the foods you shared.

Love "the doing" comes before and creates love "the feeling," if it is real love.

Remember your vows to each other and "do the works you did at first" to rekindle your love for each other.
